Participants must bring 5 copies of their resume or CV and other background information for review with program faculty and mentors and be prepared to interview for a promotional position. It is also recommended that participants bring their business cards to exchange with others. Dress code is business casual. This is an intensive development program and as such, participants should expect to immerse themselves in the program. In order to gain the greatest benefit, participants are discouraged from attempting to fulfill their job responsibilities during the course of the program.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

In order to graduate from the LDPHE course, participants **must** attend all meetings and workshops scheduled on the program agenda for all days of the conference. Please note that program events may be scheduled into the early evening or after dinner.

TUITION AND FEES

Program Reservation Fee: \$100 (this non-refundable fee is applied towards the full tuition)

REGISTRATION AND CANCELLATION POLICY

Space is reserved with a \$100 non-refundable, administration fee per participant (included in the full tuition), which must accompany completed registration form to guarantee space. All cancellations or transfers will be subject to the following policy as well as any additional charges related to materials or lodging for each program participant.

Transfers:

- * Transfer to another session may be made up to one week prior to the program start date and will be subject to a \$100 transfer fee.
- * Transfer requests made within one week of the program start date will incur a charge of 10% of the full program fee.
- * Transferees will be required to pay fee increases, should any take place.

Substitutions:

- * Substitution of registrants in a session can be made for participants to attend on your original program date.
- * Substitutions cannot be made within one week of the program date.

Cancellations & Refunds:

- * There will be no full refunds for cancellations made less than four weeks prior to the program start date.
- * Participants who cancel within four weeks of the program start date will incur a charge of 25% of the full program fee.

Nationwide, Asian and Pacific Islanders (APIs) represent less than 1% of all presidents/CEOs of colleges and universities and 2% of senior level administrators while their enrollment surpasses 6% of the approximately 17 million higher education students, and now comprise nearly 5% of the nation's total population. This disparity is both alarming and unacceptable and underscores the urgent need to develop a pool of API educators in critical positions of leadership.

Created in 1997, the Leadership Development Program for Higher Education (LDPHE) promotes the professional development of APIs in leadership roles as executives, managers, faculty and staff in our nation's colleges and universities. Conducted by Leadership Education for Asian Pacifics, Inc. (LEAP) in partnership with Asian Pacific Americans in Higher Education (APAHE), the LDPHE is the only program in the United States that provides leadership training based on a unique understanding of API values, styles, and contributions. The program's success is largely due to the personal coaching and invaluable insights that prominent API leaders in higher education share with participants.

LDPHE is an intensive, four-day experience, with a format that focuses on in-depth interactions between participants and program faculty. Program features include: hands-on workshops, mentoring, and interactive dialogues with API educational leaders who help guide participants in developing their personalized leadership career plans. In addition to leadership skills training, the program is also designed to build networks among participants, leading college and university presidents, faculty and senior administrators.

Past participants include tenured professors, administrators, and support staff from diverse disciplines such as science and engineering, student services, and fiscal management, more than 80% of whom have been promoted to advanced leadership roles in higher education. Among the program's "honor roll" are presidents, vice presidents, deans, faculty department chairs, and program directors.

Asian and Pacific Islander (API) administrators, faculty and staff who have demonstrated a commitment to their personal and professional development and who are motivated to advance their careers in the field of higher education
